BIOGRAPHY

1898	Born 30 July, Castleford, Yorkshire
1902–10	Attends elementary school in Castleford, wins scholarship to Castleford Secondary School where help and encouragement is received from art teacher, Alice Gostick
1915–6	Receives Cambridge Leaving Certificate, becomes a student teacher; teaches at former elementary school in Temple Street, Castleford
1917	Travels to London to enlist in Fifteenth Civil Service Rifles, London Regiment; visits British Museum for first time; sent to France, but returns to England after being gassed during battle of Cambrai
1918	Spends two months in hospital in Cardiff, followed by army fitness course and promotion to lance corporal; returns to active service, reaching France just before Armistice
1919–20	Returns to teaching in Castleford, attends pottery classes
	Receives ex-servicemen's education grant to begin studies at Leeds School of Art, becoming first student of new sculpture department; Barbara Hepworth is fellow student
1921	Moves to London with scholarship to study at Royal College of Art; taught by Leon Underwood, a collector of African art and promotor of direct carving; frequents British Museum and visits sculptor Jacob Epstein, who owns collection of Egyptian and tribal art; carves first 'Mother and Child'
1923	Travels to Paris for first time; studies Auguste Pellerin's Cézanne paintings; visits Musée du Louvre, Palais de Trocadéro, and Musée Guimet
1924	First carvings exhibited in group show at Redfern Gallery, London
	Accepts appointment as part-time instructor at Royal College of Art Sculpture School; awarded Royal College of Art travelling scholarship and studies Renaissance art during six months spent touring Italy the following year
1926	Participates in group exhibition at St George's Gallery, London
1927	Exhibits in group show at Beaux-Arts Gallery, London
1928	First solo exhibition held at Warren Gallery, London; works purchased by Epstein and Augustus John
	First public commission, relief sculpture 'West Wind', for new London Underground

headquarters, above St. James's Park Underground Station

1929	Completes Hornton stone 'Reclining Figure', inspired by Toltec carving of rain spirit Chacmool
	Marries Irina Radetsky, a Russian painting student at Royal College of Art; the couple move to Hampstead, where friends include Barbara Hepworth, Ben Nicholson, Naum Gabo, and critic Herbert Read
1930	Joins the avant-garde Seven and Five Society; work exhibited at British Pavilion, XVII Venice Biennale
1931	Resigns from teaching position at Royal College of Art and begins at Chelsea School of Art, London; appointed head of new sculpture department the following year
	Second solo exhibition held at Leicester Galleries, London, results in first foreign sale to Museum für Kunst und Gewerbe, Hamburg (additional exhibitions at Leicester Galleries in 1933, 1936 and 1939)
	Purchases cottage in Barfreston, Kent, with room to carve outdoors
1932	Purchases first camera
1933	Becomes member of Paul Nash's new avant-garde group Unit One; the group's only exhibition is held at Mayor Gallery, London, the following year
1934	First monograph Henry Moore, Sculptor by Herbert Read, published by A. Zwemmer, London
	Holidays in Spain and France; visits prehistoric caves at Altamira, Les Eyzies, Font de Gaume, and the battlefield of Cambrai
1935	Begins to submit work to intense photographic examination and begins working with small maquettes; Bernard Meadows employed as assistant
1936	Serves on organising committee and participates in first <i>International Surrealist Exhibition</i> , New Burlington Galleries, London; one of fifteen signatories on English Surrealist group's manifesto against non intervention in Spanish Civil War
	'Two Forms' loaned to <i>Cubism and Abstract Art</i> , Museum of Modern Art, New York; subsequently purchased, becoming first Moore sculpture in an American public collection
1937	Visits Picasso's studio in Paris where 'Guernica' is in progress; illustrates cover for issue of Contemporary Poetry and Prose dedicated to Republican efforts in Spain
1938	Participates in <i>International Exhibition of Abstract Art</i> , Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; includes works by Constantin Brancusi, Paul Klee, and Piet Mondrian
	Produces lead figurines, preferring modelling and casting to direct carving

1939	Resigns from teaching position at Chelsea School of Art as school relocates to Northampton due to outbreak of Second World War; takes over Hepworth's former Hampstead studio
	First elmwood 'Reclining Figure' sold to Albright-Knox Art Gallery, Buffalo, New York; green Hornton stone 'Recumbent Figure' presented to Tate Gallery, London
1940	Begins <i>Shelter Drawings</i> , depicting those taking refuge in the London Underground during the Blitz; appointed Official War Artist by National Gallery director, Sir Kenneth Clark
	Hampstead studio damaged in bombing raid; moves to 'Hoglands', a farmhouse in the hamlet of Perry Green, near Much Hadham, Hertfordshire, where he remains for the rest of his life
1941	First retrospective exhibition at Temple Newsam House, Leeds, with Graham Sutherland and John Piper
	Appointed Trustee of Tate Gallery, London, until 1956
	Returns to Castleford, Yorkshire, to sketch coalminers at Wheldale Colliery
1942	Appointed to Art Panel of Council for Encouragement of Music and the Arts (CEMA), later Arts Council of Great Britain
1943	First solo exhibition abroad at Buchholz Gallery, New York; includes watercolours and drawings
	Monograph by Geoffrey Grigson published by Penguin Books, part of <i>Penguin Modern Painters</i> series
1944	Installs Hornton stone 'Madonna and Child', commissioned by Canon Walter Hussey for St. Matthew's Church, Northampton
	First of six volumes of catalogue raisonné, documenting complete sculpture, <i>Henry Moore: Sculpture and Drawings</i> 1921–1948, edited by David Sylvester with an introduction by Herbert Read, published by Percy Lund, Humphries & Company and A. Zwemmer, London
1945	First postwar visit to Paris for British Council group exhibition, <i>Quelques contemporains anglais</i> , where he meets Constantin Brancusi
	Awarded Honorary Doctorate from University of Leeds, the first of many national and international awards
1946	Installation of 'Memorial Figure' at Dartington Hall, Devon
	Birth of daughter, Mary
	First visit to United States for major retrospective at Museum of Modern Art, New York; exhibition tours to Art Institute of Chicago and San Francisco Museum of Art; meets Jackson Pollock, Georgia O'Keeffe, Mark Tobey, and other notable American artists

1947	Appointed member of Royal Fine Arts Commission (1947–52); solo exhibition of sculpture and drawings, organised by British Council, tours Australia from Art Gallery of New South Wales, Sydney
1948	Committee member of first London County Council open-air exhibition of sculpture held at Battersea Park, London; 'Three Standing Figures' exhibited
	Visits Venice for solo exhibition at British Pavilion, XXIV Biennale; wins International Prize for Sculpture
1949	'Madonna and Child' installed at St Peter's, Claydon, Suffolk; <i>Henry Moore: Sculpture and Drawings 1923–48</i> , opens at Wakefield City Art Gallery and then Manchester City Art Gallery; tours to Brussels, Paris, Amsterdam, Hamburg, Dusseldorf, Bern, and Athens; 'Family Group' installed at Barclay School, Stevenage
1950	Fernand Léger visits studio
1951	Travels to Greece, for first and only time, on occasion of British Council exhibition at Zappeion Gallery, Athens; visits Mycenae, Corinth, Delphi, Olympia and the Acropolis
	Retrospective exhibition at Tate Gallery, London, on occasion of Festival of Britain; 'Reclining Figure: Festival' exhibited at main entrance to South Bank Festival site
1953	Begins elmwood carving 'Upright Internal/External Forms', takes over two years to complete; completes 'Draped Reclining Figure' and 'Time-Life Screen', for Time-Life Building, London
	Wins International Sculpture Prize at second São Paulo Biennial; travels to Brazil and Mexico
1954	Designs red brick relief for Bouwcentrum, Rotterdam; travels to Italy, Germany and The Netherlands
1955	Travels to Yugoslavia, on occasion of solo exhibition organised by British Council which tours worldwide until 1959
	Appointed member of Order of the Companions of Honour (having previously declined a knighthood), and trustee of National Gallery, London until 1974 Foreign Honorary Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences
	Work included at first Documenta, Kassel, Germany
1956	Completion of 'Family Group' for Harlow Arts Trust
1957	Begins major commission for UNESCO; marble 'Reclining Figure' installed outside UNESCO headquarters, Paris, the following year; exhibits at Galerie Berggruen, Paris; awarded prize at Carnegie International, Pittsburgh

1958	Travels to Auschwitz, Poland, as chairman of Auschwitz Memorial Committee, and to United States; awarded Honorary Doctor of Arts, Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts
